

Reception Class Parent Information

The government advises that there should not be any set homework given to children In Reception Class at school.

Having said this, there are many things you can do at home to spend time with your children to support their learning growth and development.

Once children have settled into school they will be issued a home school reading diary. Whenever children read and share books with us in school we will record this in their diary. As the children begin to develop a love of books, we would ask that you take the time to share stories and read with your children at home. If any reading and book sharing that you do at home is also recorded in your child's home school diary it will help to form a good link between school and home.

Children will start a phonics programme in school. Every week they will be introduced to new letter sounds and formations. Children will be given homework packs containing the sounds and letters the children will be focusing on this term. There will be a range of suggested activities to help consolidate the learning taking place in school which we would recommend doing with your child at home.

When children are ready we will issue them with a home reading book which will be changed in school regularly. This will be when your child is ready and will differ for every child.

Suggested activities to support our 'All about Me' topic:

| Notice numbers when out and about. Go on a number |

Take a trip to the library and find books to share together. Can you find any that are about family, friends or autumn? You could find some fact books about the body.

Can you sing the alphabet at home? Count to 10 and back down again? Talk about what day of the week it is and what month it is on your journey to school.

Practise making numbers and letters in fun ways...can you make a number 3 out of spaghetti? Draw a letter 'a' in chalk outside on the floor or write the letters of your name in paint or in the sand?
